WASHINGTON, DC – What do internet addiction, marital conflicts, spiritual accompaniment and liturgical developments have in common? These are just some of the topics that will be discussed during the Washington Theological Union's 2010-2011 Nourishment for Ministry Lecture Series. Created to enrich ordained and lay ministers on key theological and pastoral issues, the Nourishment for Ministry program offers presentations that discuss relevant issues that affect the Church today.
